Winter Storm Planning

A Few Days Out: Have emergency supplies for your home and car. Check all smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Fill your gas tank and have fuel for generators.

The Day Before the Storm: Have multiple ways to monitor the storms and receive warnings. Be mindful of outdoor pets - have ample food and water, bring pets indoors if possible.

During and After the Storm: Check on neighbors and family. Properly ventilate emergency heat sources ensuring that generators are at least 20 feet from your home. When shoveling take it easy and do not strain yourself.

Be Prepared for the Cold * * Winter Driving Safety Tips:

- **Drive with Caution** road conditions can be dangerous. Keep space between yourself and the vehicle in front of you. Maintain a safe speed, avoid sudden braking and turning to avoid losing control of your vehicle.
- Black Ice can be hard to see on the road since it is a clear sheet of ice on the road.
- An Emergency Kit in your vehicle in case you were to get stranded. Included items such as a blanket, gloves, hat, snow shovel, kitty litter, snow shovel, flashlight, phone charger, water.
- Is it necessary to be on the road if there is bad weather. Being on the roads also could not be permitted due to the current snow level.

DO YOU KNOW THE DIFFERENCE IN SNOW LEVELS?

LEVEL 1: Roadways are hazardous with blowing and drifting snow. Roads are also icy. Drive with cautious. **LEVEL 2:** Roadways are hazardous with blowing and

drifting snow. Only those who feel it necessary to drive should be out on the roads. Contact your employer to see if you should report to work.

LEVEL 3: All roadways are closed to non-emergency personnel. No one should be out during these conditions unless it is absolutely

necessary to travel.

Those traveling on the roads may subject themselves to arrest.
